


Celebrating 100 Years of Ynysangharad War Memorial Park



Pontypridd Urban District Council

In 1897, the Pontypridd Urban District Council proposed transforming Ynysangharad Fields into a park, recognising the need for a community gathering place. Negotiations with the Llanover Estate, the site's owners, progressed slowly, but the community's desire for a park grew stronger with the devastating impact of the First World War. In 1919, the council launched an appeal to raise funds to purchase Ynysangharad Fields, with the Miners' Welfare Fund playing a crucial role by providing substantial financial assistance. By 1923, the land acquisition was complete, marking the beginning of the transformation into Ynysangharad War Memorial Park.


Ynysangharad Fields

Ynysangharad Fields holds a rich past that predates its transformation into Ynysangharad War Memorial Park. The area was home to a traditional Welsh farmhouse known as 'tŷ hir' or 'long house' since at least 1740. Notably, the esteemed Welsh Methodist evangelist Howell Harris stayed overnight at the farmhouse, leaving his mark on the area's history.

As time passed, Ynysangharad Fields became more than just a farmhouse and agricultural land. It became intricately intertwined with the industrial history of Pontypridd. One notable chapter in its history unfolded with the establishment of the Brown Lennox chainworks in 1818. The presence of the chainworks brought about a flurry of activity and employment opportunities in the area. It also left a lasting impression on the evolving landscape of Ynysangharad Fields in the North East part of the site.

As the town of Pontypridd experienced rapid industrialisation and the clamour of progress echoed through its streets, the needs and aspirations of the community began to shift. The demand for open spaces where families could escape the hustle and bustle of urban life became increasingly apparent. Something new was growing in the fields. The potential to develop this strategic area further, to meet this changing scenario was becoming ever more apparent.

Welcome to Ynysangharad War Memorial Park


On August 6th, 1923, the community of Pontypridd eagerly gathered to witness the unveiling of Ynysangharad War Memorial Park. Field-Marshal Viscount Allenby, a revered military figure, played a pivotal role in the ceremony, adding solemnity and gravitas to the occasion. As the crowd gathered on that momentous day, their eyes were drawn to the park and another poignant memorial that would forever stand as a testament to the valour and sacrifice of the 5th Battalion, The Welch Regiment.

In a powerful gesture, Viscount Allenby unveiled the memorial on the Common, paying homage to those brave soldiers who had fought and perished in the defence of freedom. It stands as a tangible symbol of remembrance, a constant reminder of the bravery and selflessness exhibited by the people of Pontypridd.

From the 6th of August 1923 onwards, the park became a place of remembrance and reflection, symbolising the resilience and unity of the community.


The Miners' Welfare Fund

The Miners' Welfare Fund was vital to the park's development. Established in 1920, the fund provided financial support to improve the social conditions of colliery workers. Their generous contributions, including £4,000 towards acquiring Ynysangharad Park, ensured the park's development. Further funding of £2,500 supported the construction of swimming baths, leading to the opening of the Lido in 1927. The Miners' Welfare Fund's contributions secured the park's status as a community space.



The National Lido of Wales

On July 30th, 1927, the Chairman of the Pontypridd Urban District Council officially opened the Lido. The Miners' Welfare Fund played a crucial role in funding around 90% of the construction costs. The Lido featured a distinctive design and became a cherished venue for swimming and leisure activities. Despite facing challenges and closures, the Lido underwent restoration in 2015, thanks to significant funding from National Lottery Heritage Fund, European Regional Development Fund and Rhondda Cynon Taf County Borough Council.



The Sporting Legacy of the Park

Ynysangharad War Memorial Park celebrates a rich sporting heritage with its well-maintained cricket field, bowling green, and football pitch. These facilities have provided recreational opportunities for locals and visitors, nurturing a strong sense of community.





The Bandstand

The Bandstand in Ynysangharad War Memorial Park has a rich history that dates to its triumphant opening on July 24th, 1926.

Despite a delay caused by rainfall, Councillor A. Seymour and Mr Cyril R. Morgan led the ceremony, accompanied by The Musicians' Union Orchestra and the Great Western Colliery Silver Band. Today, the Bandstand remains a much-loved venue for music and merriment, hosting various performers and leaving a lasting impact. In 2022, a rejuvenation journey began with support from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, restoring the Bandstand to its original design and adding a magnificent weathervane inspired by Albert Edward Parfitt's original design. The Bandstand now stands resplendent and ready to welcome melodies again, serving as a testament to the park's commitment to being a land of song.

A Land of Song

Within Ynysangharad War Memorial Park stands a tribute to Evan James and James James, who gifted Wales its national anthem, "Hen Wlad Fy Nhadau."

The memorial unveiled in 1930. honours their contribution to Welsh cultural heritage. The campaign for the memorial began in 1929, with local teacher Rhys Morgan leading the appeal for contributions. Designed by Sir William Goscombe John, the memorial features bronze figures representing poetry and music, symbolising the essence of the anthem. It stands as a reminder of the enduring power of music to unite a nation and fills us with pride in Ynysangharad War Memorial Park.

Ynysangharad War Memorial Park has overcome various challenges throughout its rich history, strengthening its bond with the community.


